LORD HEADLEY.

Lord Headley, a Representative Peer of Ireland, died in a nursing home in Dublin yesterday, at the age of 67.

Charles Mark Allanson Winn, Lord Headley, Baron Allanson of Aghadoe, Co. Kerry, succeeded his father, who was also a Representative Peer of Ireland, in 1877 as the fourth holder of the titles, which were conferred on George Winn towards the end of the 18th century in reward for his services as an English Baron of the Court of Exchequer in Scotland. He was educated at Harrow and Oxford. He went through the Franco-German War with General von Gōbene's staff, and from 1887 to 1892 he held the rank of lieutenant-colonel, commanding the 4th Battalion Royal Munster Fusiliers. He married in 1867 Bessie Housemayne, daughter of the Rev. John Blennerhassett, rector of Ryme, Dorset, and by her had one daughter, Avis, who married Mr. Herbert Crosse, of Newell House, Sherborne. He died in 1908, and in 1911 his widow married Mr. R. Llewellyn Jones Llewellyn, M.B. The title passes to Mr. Rowland George Allanson Allanson-Winn, M.I.C.E., a first cousin, who was born in 1856 and married in 1899 Teresa St. Josephine, daughter of the late Mr. W. H. Johnson, and has issue four sons, the eldest of whom is Rowland Patrick John George, now heir to the barony. The new peer is a notable sportsman. At Cambridge he won the middle and heavy weights at boxing, and has written books on the art of self-defence. He is also fond of fishing, rowing, skating, swimming, fencing, shooting, and golf. The family seats are Aghadoe House, Killarney, and Warley Lodge, Brentwood.
